Chairman Wyden and Ranking Member Murkowski:


We applaud your leadership in examining the need to reform the way the Forest Service copes with increasing wildfire management challenges and the need to reform the management of the National Forest System. We commend you for tackling these nationally important issues on a bipartisan basis.

As the testimony in the June 4th and June 25th hearings in the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee demonstrated, the status quo on our federal forests is unacceptable. The Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management face a dire situation due to the growth of wildfire suppression spending which has disrupted the already strained budget for forest management. This not only affects the operations of our National Forests, but also causes severe economic consequences for the surrounding rural communities. We appreciate the Committee's renewed focus on addressing the root cause of these economic and social hardships through reform of the National Forest System intended to increase the pace and scale of forest management, including timber harvest.

We also appreciate the one year of bridge funding for the Secure Rural Schools program that was included in the recently passed Helium Stewardship Act of 2013 (Public Law No: 113-40). Until forest reform legislation can be enacted, we must have short-term bridge funding to prevent further economic dislocation in counties with significant federal forest.

We look forward to legislation to restore the health of all our Federal forests and strengthening our rural communities. Recognizing that we are in a new budget environment with the agencies having to do more with less, please let us know how we can work with you to improve the management of our federal forests.


