Dear Majority Leader McConnell and Minority Leader Schumer,

As we work towards another COVID-19 relief package, we write to urge you to include authority for the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to grant states waivers to allow college students to access the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) during the pandemic.

As you know, COVID-19 has increased food insecurity across the country. Feeding America estimates that an additional 17.1 million Americans could become food insecure due to the COVID-19 economic crisis, an increase of 46%. College students, too, are feeling the economic pain from COVID-19. As schools across the country shut their doors and move to remote learning, students who relied on school food banks or on-campus food programs have seen those resources disappear. While the Families First Coronavirus Response Act suspended SNAP work requirement for Able-Bodied Adults Without Dependents (ABAWDs), this relief was not extended to college students. As stay at home orders remain in place, students that have lost their jobs are now also at risk of losing essential food benefits because they can no longer meet SNAP requirements and many newly displaced working college students cannot qualify for food benefits.

Since the COVID-19 crisis began, 30 states, plus the District of Columbia, have applied for a waiver to allow students to qualify for SNAP benefits, regardless of their employment status. These claims were denied by the USDA, citing a lack of legal authority to grant such waivers. To provide governors the flexibility to respond to this crisis, and parity for student SNAP recipients, we urge you to include in the next COVID-19 relief package a requirement that USDA approve these student eligibility waivers submitted by states.

Thank you for your attention to this important request to ensure that our college students have access to the resources they need during this challenging time.
