



Dear Potential Federal Public Assistance Applicant:

On August 9, 2016, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) declared a Major Disaster (FEMA-4276-WI-DR) for the State of Wisconsin. This declaration makes Federal funding is available to state, eligible local governments, and certain private nonprofit organizations on a cost-sharing basis for emergency work and the repair or replacement of facilities damaged by the July 11 thorough 12, 2016 severe storms and flooding for the following designated areas: Ashland County, Bad River Band of Lake Superior Chippewa, Bayfield County, Burnett County, Douglas County, Florence County, Iron County, Sawyer County, and Washburn County.

To apply for the FEMA Public Assistance Program you must submit a completed Request for Public Assistance (RPA) no later than September 8, 2016. This one page form should take less than 10 minutes to complete and is included in this packet.

In addition to the RPA, Wisconsin Emergency Management requests that you submit the attached State of Wisconsin Questionnaire to facilitate award documents, payments and communications. The questionnaire asks for the following three items of information:

- DUNS Number: required by FEMA and WEM if approved for funding
- Applicant E-mail Address: required by WEM to receive information regarding your application
- Wisconsin Tax ID: required by the State if you are approved for funding

Please submit this information along with your RPA form **no later than September 8, 2016.** You may submit these forms electronically to DMAWEMPublicAssistance@wisconsin.gov or fax them to 608-223-6526.

Wisconsin Emergency Management and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) will be holding applicant briefings in each declared area listed above from August 16 through 18, 2016. If your organization cannot attend the applicant briefing, you may review the presentation materials on the Wisconsin Emergency Management website at http://emergencymanagement.wi.gov/recovery/public-assistance.asp.

Dun & Bradstreet (D&B) DUNS Number

What is it and why does my institution have to provide it?

A DUNS number is a unique nine digit identification number that is free for all businesses required to register with the US Federal government for contracts or grants. Any entity that has applied for any sort of federal funding in the past should have a DUNS number already assigned. MB has adopted the use of DUNS numbers as a way to keep track of how federal grant money is dispersed. To learn more about the policy, you can read the <u>Federal Registrar Notice</u> (4-page PDF).

How do I find out my institution's DUNS number?

You should ask your institution's grant administrator or chief financial officer to provide your institution's DUNS number. Research universities and most colleges, independent libraries, and large organizations already have DUNS numbers. What if my institution does not have a DUNS number?

WEM requires that you have an e-mail address for the person managing your grants. This will help us communicate quickly and effectively with you throughout the process of your various projects.

Applicant WI Tax ID:

When the State of Wisconsin requests checks for payment we need the WI Tax ID for that jurisdiction/agency/non-profit prior to making any payments. Some applicants will be asked to submit a W-9 to verify their Tax ID if they have never received a check from the State system (typically applies only to non-profits).

DUNS NUMBER REQUIRED FOR ALL APPLICATIONS

Dun & Bradstreet (D&B) keeps track of more than 70 million businesses world-wide through its Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS). In recent years, the DUNS number has become increasingly important to both federal and local governments, and national arts organizations.

First, the federal government, adopted a new policy that requires all organizations to provide a DUNS number as part of their grant applications. Even Subgrantees are now required to obtain the DUNS number on their applications.

There is no fee for registering for a DUNS number. Organizations may register by phone or online. However, online registrations may take up to 30 days, so it is important that you begin the process now.

What's the easiest way to get a DUNS number?

It only takes a day to get a DUNS number from D&B by phone (you may be on hold for a little while), but Internet applications can take up to 30 days! Note that an authorizing official, not a project director, of the organization should request a DUNS number.

Call D&B's special toll-free number for federal grant applicants: **1-866-705-5711**. When you call, tell the operator that you are applying to a federal grant program and need to register for a DUNS number. The process will take about ten minutes. You will be asked to provide the following information (subject to minor changes):

- Legal name of organization
- Physical address (and PO box if you have one)
- Telephone number
- Web address
- Name of the authorizing official (e.g., president, director, etc.)
- The purpose of your organization (e.g., non-profit dance company to perform and create work)
- Total number of employees

Your organization can also register for a DUNS number via D&B's Web site. Choose the "DUNS number only" option. Please note that registration via the website may take up to 30 business days to complete.







Facility, Work and Cost Eligibility

- Damage must be disaster related
- Facility must be the legal responsibility of eligible subrecipient
- Have been in active use at the time of the disaster
- Be located in the designated disaster area
- Damage not covered by insurance
- Can't be funded by another Federal Agency

Kickoff Exploratory Call

- Exploratory Call: FEMA will start talking about your projects







Kickoff Meeting

Hazard Mitigation Grant Program

- Eligible subrecipients: state/local/tribal governments and private non-profits
- Available statewide
- 75% FEMA, 12.5% state, 12.5% local match
- Estimated at \$5 million for DR-4276
- 7% available for hazard mitigation planning
- 5% Initiative funding for state priorities that may not pass a benefit-cost analysis



Local Match

- Any non-federal source
 CDBG is pass-through money and loses federal identity

Public Assistance Program Procurement Cheat Sheet

WEM's Procurement Cheat Sheet for the Public Assistance Program

Micro-Purchase Procedures (Federal; 2 C.F.R. § 200.320(a)) \$3,000.00 or less

- The acquisition of supplies or services, the aggregate dollar amount of which does not exceed the micro-purchase threshold = \$3,000.00
- To the extent practicable, must distribute micro-purchases equitably among qualified suppliers
- May be awarded without soliciting competitive quotations if the non-Federal entity considers the price to be reasonable

Small Purchase Procedures <mark>(Federal; 2 C.F.R. § 200.320(b))</mark> aka "Simplified Bid Process" (State)

\$3,000 to \$50,000

- Relatively simple and informal procurement methods for securing services, supplies, or other property that does not cost more than the simplified acquisition threshold (Federal)
- Obtain a minimum of three (3) bids via phone, catalog, internet, fax, etc. The awarded bid must be confirmed in writing (State)
- Avoid sole source contracts for contracts above \$5,000 (State)
- NOTE: State sets the top end of the threshold; Federal guidelines are set to \$150,000, but we follow
 the standard that is the most restrictive

Formal Procurement Methods \$50,000 and up (State)

- You *should* have some sort of written procedures for procurement transactions that help decide which type of formal method you use (Federal)
- State agencies have stricter standards for Procuring Services above \$50,000 (State)

Sealed Bidding (Federal; 2 C.F.R. § 200.320(c))

- Bids are publicly solicited and a firm fixed price contract (lump sum or unit price) is awarded to the "responsible" bidder whose bid, conforming with all the material terms and conditions of the invitation for bids (IFB), is the lowest in price
- Bids must be solicited from an "adequate number of known suppliers," providing them sufficient response time before the date of opening of the bids
- Governments must publicly advertise the invitation for bids (change) (Federal)
- All bids will be opened at the time and place prescribed in the invitation for bids, and for local and tribal governments, the bids must be opened publicly (change) (Federal)
- This method is preferred for construction when sealed bidding is feasible, which is when certain conditions are present
- Other procedural requirements at 2 C.F.R. § 200.320(c)(2) (Federal)

Competitive Proposals (Federal; 2 C.F.R. § 200.320(d))

- Competitive proposals are generally used when conditions are not appropriate for sealed bids
- The appropriate method when more than one source is expected to submit an offer and either a fixedprice or cost-reimbursement type contract is awarded
- Requests for proposals must be publicized and identify all evaluation factors and their relative importance
- Proposals must be solicited from an adequate number of qualified sources
- Must have written method for conducting technical evaluations of the proposals received and for selection of the contractor
- Awards will be made to the responsible firm whose proposal is most advantageous to the program, with price and other factors considered

WEM's Procurement Cheat Sheet for the Public Assistance Program

What is Socioeconomic Contracting?

Socioeconomic contracting is a requirement where you take affirmative steps to assure that minority businesses, women's business enterprises, and labor surplus area firms are used **when possible** (2 C.F.R. § 200.321) The affirmative steps must include at least the following:

- Placing qualified small and minority businesses and women's business enterprises on solicitation lists
- Assuring that small and minority businesses, and women's business enterprises are solicited whenever they are potential sources
- Dividing total requirements, when economically feasible, into smaller tasks or quantities to permit maximum participation by small and minority businesses, and women's business enterprises
- Establishing delivery schedules, where the requirement permits, which encourage participation by small and minority businesses, and women's business enterprises
- Using the services and assistance, as appropriate, of such organizations as the Small Business
 Administration and the Minority Business Development Agency of the Department of Commerce
- Requiring the prime contractor, if subcontracts are to be let, to take the five previous, affirmative steps
- Failure to comply with the former, equivalent procurement standard has been a very common finding in Office of Inspector General audits

Failure carry out these affirmative steps is frequently identified as a justification to de-obligate funding by the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Office of Inspector General (OIG).

What is "Cost Plus Percentage of Cost" contracting?

A cost-plus-percentage-of-cost contract is a cost reimbursement contract containing some elements that obligates the applicant to pay the contractor an amount (in the form of either profit or cost), which cannot be determined at the time the contract is made and incurred in the future. In other words, you are contracted to pay costs to perform the work, plus a commission based on the percentage of these future incurred costs.

Federal regulations prohibit costplus-percentage-of-cost contracts because they provide no incentive for contractors to control costs—the more contractors charge, the more profit they make.

See the example to the right. This contractor's profit varies with the actual cost to perform the work. Total costs, including profit, are agreed to in negotiations prior to the work starting. The profit or "Fixed Fee" part of the invoice, highlighted in yellow, varies with the actual costs to perform the work. (Without looking at the specifics of the contract or purchase order, this cost would be deemed ineligible).

Some projects can start without detailed review:

- Emergency Protective Actions
- Debris removal
- Repairs to pre-disaster condition or temporary repairs (unless 50 years old or older)

Some projects require more detailed environmental review:

- Debris disposal
- Projects that change a facility from its pre-disaster condition
- Hazard mitigation projects
- Projects affecting threatened/ endangered species, wetlands or floodplains

Some projects require review and consultation:

- Improved/Alternate projects
- Projects with the potential to significantly impact the environment

Historic Preservation

Any structure **50 years old or older** may be eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. These resources (including buildings, bridges, culverts) must be reviewed by FEMA and the WI State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO).

Projects involving ground disturbance outside previously disturbed footprint (including facility realignment, borrow areas,

utility burial, utility pole replacement, access roads, etc.) may require archaeological review prior to construction.

Debris Disposal

Applicants must follow guidance provided by the Wisconsin DNR and complete a Debris Management Self Certification Form for any debris project. Temporary debris storage outside licensed landfills, requires

approval from the WI DNR.

Burning demolition material or using an air curtain burner requires a permit from WI Debris removal

Culverts, Bridges & Work in Water



Projects involving proposed or completed work in a waterway, must include documentation of contact with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and or the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Either a copy of a permit or letter from DNR indicating no permit is required will be required before project closeout.

Demolition Debris Management of Debris Resulting from Natural Disasters or Planned Demolition Activities

Each year, severe storms destroy homes, barns and other buildings across Wisconsin. In a crisis, emergency management of debris places yet another burden on property owners and emergency managers. Typically, a great deal of demolition debris needs to be managed in a short period of time.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is concerned with public health, safety, and environmental impacts when demolition debris is mismanaged. The Solid Waste Program offers assistance to communities in managing storm-generated debris, and to individuals interested in razing a single structure.

Typical types of waste generated from both natural disasters and planned demolition activities, along with proper disposal methods, are listed below.

CLEAN¹ SOIL, BRICK, BUILDING STONE, CONCRETE, BROKEN ASPHALT PAVEMENT, WOOD WASTE FROM DOWNED TREES, AND UNPAINTED OR UNTREATED WOOD

These items may be disposed of *without Department approval* as long as the site selected does not impact surface waters, wetlands, floodplains, and critical habitat areas. Contact waste staff for assistance on locating an appropriate disposal site. The term "clean" refers to material that is unpainted, untreated, and not contaminated with petroleum or other contaminants. Communities should consider composting or chipping smaller wood waste for use in landscapes damaged by the storm event or offering clean wood waste for use as firewood. Clean brick, building stone, concrete and asphalt may be stockpiled for crushing and reusing in future building projects.

ROOFING METALS, SIDING, AND OTHER METALS INCLUDING APPLIANCES

This material may be easily recycled and therefore should be stockpiled and hauled to a scrap metal recycler. Some appliances may contain hazardous substances such as Freon. Freon must be removed by qualified and licensed personnel and items containing Freon or other hazardous substances should be stockpiled separately from other metals. You may want to consider incorporating a list of metal and appliance recyclers into each County Emergency Plan.

ASBESTOS CONTAINING MATERIALS - SIDING, FLOORING, ROOFING AND INSULATION

Asbestos containing items normally require special handling by **licensed** personnel and proper disposal. You should always

contact your local Air Management Specialist for details on proper identification and handling of materials containing asbestos. Please see the statewide contact list on the reverse side for this assistance.

HAZARDOUS WASTE IN THE FORM OF PAINTS, SOLVENTS, FUELS AND PESTICIDES

Many municipalities have collection programs capable of handling household hazardous wastes. If your community does not have a household hazardous waste program, arrangements can be made with an outside contractor to establish a household hazardous waste disposal drop-off and collection service. You should always contact your local DNR Waste Staff for details and assistance in obtaining approval by using the list of contacts on the reverse side. Staff can also assist communities with questions regarding proper management and disposal of contaminated soil.

GLASS, ASPHALT AND FIBERGLASS ROOFING, CARPETING AND PAD, INSULATION, PVC PIPING, SIDING, DRYWALL, PLASTER AND PERSONAL ITEMS SUCH AS CLOTHING AND FURNITURE

Items that cannot be recycled or reused require disposal in a local licensed landfill, or an approved one-time disposal or construction and demolition landfill site.²

OPEN BURNING

Open burning of trees³, wood, brush, and other clean wood waste is an option, but *requires prior DNR approval or concurrence*; however, this may not be the best option. Open burning results in the release of contaminants to the air, water and land, and may have an adverse impact on human health and the environment. Also, a fire spreading out of control is always a serious concern and stretches needed emergency personnel even thinner. A wild fire resulting from open burning activities could cost you money, if the local fire department is called out to suppress the fire. Chipping, composting, and using clean wood waste for firewood should be the options considered first!

There is no substitute for careful planning before an emergency occurs. Emergency planning should include a current list of DNR contacts that can assist communities in an emergency. These plans may also identify the location and transportation routes to licensed disposal facilities and household hazardous waste collection facilities. Similarly, communities should identify areas where clean wood wastes, metals and clean concrete, block, brick, etc. may be segregated for proper management once the emergency has subsided. Communities may consider pursuing the development of an approved small demolition landfill.

SUBJECT: Disposal of solid waste generated from this storm and flood event

Solid waste generated from this event will generally be waste asphalt, waste concrete, metal waste (culverts, bridge components, etc.), treated wood, plastic culverts, tree stumps and other types of solid waste.

- Waste asphalt pavement, all types of waste concrete, clean, untreated and unpainted wood and all metal waste should be recycled if possible.
- The waste listed above may be temporarily stored in areas that are <u>not</u> in a floodplain, <u>nor</u> in any areas where a significant adverse impact on wetlands could occur, where a take of an endangered or threatened species could occur, where a detrimental effect on any surface water could occur, where a detrimental effect on groundwater quality could occur, or in any area where explosive gases could concentrate or where hazardous air contaminants could be released.
- If not recycled, clean soil (<u>including emptied sand bags or sandbags made of degradable material</u>); brick; building stone; asphalt pavement; concrete; reinforced concrete; and clean, untreated wood not painted with lead based paint, may be disposed on site if the location does not have an impact on any of the criteria listed in the bullet above. The disposal site should be covered with a minimum of two feet of fine-grained soil and six inches of top soil which is seeded, fertilized and mulched to stabilize. The disposal site shall be operated in a nuisance-free and aesthetic manner.
- Treated wood (treated with preservatives, glues or lead-based paint) must be disposed in a municipal solid waste landfill, construction and demolition waste landfill or through a solid waste transfer facility.
- Clean wood that is not painted, treated or glued can be chipped for landscaping wood chips or boiler fuel. For a list of wood chipping companies please look here:

- Attached is a Flood and storm waste management options checklist to assist in determining how to manage waste and, for reference, listings for woodburning facilities, solid waste transfer facilities, municipal solid waste landfills and construction and demolition waste landfills that may be able to accept and manage solid waste for you.
- For marinas, boat owners and others in eastern Ashland and Iron Counties, the Gogebic Range Solid Waste Transfer Facility in Ironwood MI (906-932-0600) and the Waste Management K & W Landfill in Ontonagon MI (call Linda at 906-883-3504) may be able to assist you in managing solid waste. The facilities listed in the bullet above are also available options. Damaged watercraft and watercraft remains must be disposed at solid waste transfer stations or municipal solid waste landfills in Wisconsin.

SUBJECT: Supplemental Information: Demolition Debris Management, July, 2016 Flood Event

The purpose of this memo is to provide supplemental information, including local Department contacts, regarding management of waste and debris generated from recent flooding events in Northwest Wisconsin. (Note: This information is a modified version of DNR publication WA601, developed specifically for this flood event.)

On July 11th & 12th severe storms and heavy rains damaged buildings, roads and marinas across Northwestern Wisconsin. It is anticipated that a great deal of demolition debris will need to be managed in a short period of time following this catastrophic event.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is concerned with public health, safety, and environmental impacts when demolition debris is mismanaged. This document provides resources to communities and businesses in managing storm-generated debris, and to individuals interested in razing a single structure.

Typical types of waste generated from both natural disasters and planned demolition activities, along with proper disposal methods, are listed below.

CLEAN₁ SOIL, BRICK, BUILDING STONE, CONCRETE, BROKEN ASPHALT PAVEMENT, WOOD WASTE FROM DOWNED TREES, AND UNPAINTED OR UNTREATED WOOD

These items may be disposed of *without Department approval* as long as the site selected does not impact surface waters, wetlands, floodplains, and critical habitat areas. Contact waste staff for assistance on locating an appropriate disposal site. The term "clean" refers to material that is unpainted, untreated, and not contaminated with petroleum or other contaminants. Communities should consider composting or chipping smaller wood waste for use in landscapes damaged by the storm event or offering clean wood waste for use as firewood. Clean brick, building stone, concrete and asphalt may be stockpiled for crushing and reusing in future building projects.

ROOFING METALS, SIDING, AND OTHER METALS INCLUDING APPLIANCES

This material may be easily recycled and therefore should be stockpiled and hauled to a scrap metal recycler. Some appliances may contain hazardous substances such as Freon. Freon must be removed by qualified and licensed personnel and items containing Freon or other hazardous substances should be stockpiled separately from other metals.

ASBESTOS CONTAINING MATERIALS - SIDING, FLOORING, ROOFING AND INSULATION

Structures that may contain asbestos items normally require special inspection and handling by **licensed** personnel and proper disposal. Contact Mr. Rick Wulk, DNR Regional Air Management Supervisor, 920-662-8151, for details on proper identification and handling of materials containing asbestos.

HAZARDOUS WASTE IN THE FORM OF PAINTS, SOLVENTS, FUELS AND PESTICIDES

Many municipalities have collection programs capable of handling household hazardous wastes. If your community does not have a household hazardous waste program, arrangements can be made with an outside contractor to establish a household hazardous waste disposal drop-off and collection service. GLASS, ASPHALT AND FIBERGLASS ROOFING, CARPETING AND PAD, INSULATION, PVC



PIPING, SIDING, DRYWALL, PLASTER AND PERSONAL ITEMS SUCH AS CLOTHING AND FURNITURE

Items that cannot be recycled or reused require disposal in a local licensed landfill, or an approved one-time disposal or construction and demolition landfill site.

OPEN BURNING

It is illegal to burn painted, treated or unclean wood, asphalt, plastics of any kind, oily substances, tires and other rubber products, garbage, recyclables, wet rubbish, and other materials. Demolition materials that cannot be burned include: roofing materials, all kinds of flooring materials, insulation, plywood and other composition board, electrical wiring, cabinetry and countertops, and plastic plumbing.

Open burning of trees, wood, brush, and other clean wood waste is an option, but *requires prior DNR approval or concurrence*; however, this may not be the best option. Please contact Mr. Rick Wulk, DNR Regional Air Management Supervisor, 920-662-5181, to discuss options and request an approval. Open burning results in the release of contaminants to the air, water and land, and may have an adverse impact on human health and the environment. Also, a fire spreading out of control is always a serious concern and stretches needed emergency personnel even thinner. A wild fire resulting from open burning activities could cost you money, if the local fire department is called out to suppress the fire. Chipping, composting, and using clean wood waste for firewood should be the options considered first!
