A BILL To establish the Commission on the COVID-19 Pandemic in the United States.
1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; SENSE OF CONGRESS.
4 (a) Short Title.—This Act may be cited as the
5 "National Commission on the COVID-19 Pandemic in the
6 United States Act".
7 (b) Sense of Congress.—It is the sense of Con-
8 gress that—
9 (1) it is important to consider what the

coronavirus disease 19 (COVID-19) pandemic re-

1	veals about the vulnerabilities to the national secu-
2	rity of the United States, especially how prepared
3	the United States would be for a biological attack
4	that not only causes public health confusion and fear
5	but also public fear similar to the level caused by a
6	terrorist attack;
7	(2) the purpose of establishing the commission
8	under section 2 is not just to look back at prior
9	practices and mistakes but to learn lessons as quick-
10	ly as possible to better protect the United States
11	going forward; and
12	(3) it is crucial to better understand the in-
13	creasing likelihood of pandemic threats (such as the
14	recent threats of severe acute respiratory syndrome
15	(SARS), Ebola, the 2009–H1N1 influenza, and
16	COVID-19) and health issues that the United
17	States could face during the next several decades.
18	SEC. 2. NATIONAL COMMISSION ON THE COVID-19 PAN-
19	DEMIC IN THE UNITED STATES.
20	(a) Establishment of Commission.—There is es-
21	tablished in the legislative branch the National Commis-
22	sion on the COVID-19 Pandemic in the United States (in
23	this section referred to as the "Commission").
24	(b) Purposes.—The purposes of the Commission are
25	to—

1	(1) examine and report upon the facts and cir-
2	cumstances relating to the outbreak and spread of
3	coronavirus disease 19 (COVID-19) caused by the
4	severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2
5	(SARS-CoV-2) (in this section referred to as
6	"COVID-19") in the United States;
7	(2) ascertain, evaluate, and report on the evi-
8	dence developed by any relevant governmental and
9	nongovernmental entities regarding the facts and
10	circumstances surrounding COVID-19;
11	(3) make a full and complete assessment and
12	accounting of the circumstances surrounding the
13	outbreak and spread of COVID-19 in the United
14	States;
15	(4) make a full and complete assessment and
16	accounting of the preparedness of the Federal Gov-
17	ernment, State governments, local governments, and
18	the private sector for the outbreak and spread of
19	COVID-19 in the United States;
20	(5) make a full and complete assessment and
21	accounting of the actions by the Federal Govern-
22	ment, State governments, local governments, and the
23	private sector in response to the outbreak and
24	spread of COVID-19 in the United States; and

1	(6) investigate and report to the President and
2	Congress on its findings, conclusions, and rec-
3	ommendations to improve the ability of the United
4	States to prepare for, detect, prevent, and, if nec-
5	essary, respond to epidemics and pandemics such as
6	COVID-19, whether naturally occurring or caused
7	by State or non-State actors.
8	(c) Composition of Commission.—
9	(1) Members.—The Commission shall be com-
10	posed of 10 members, of whom—
11	(A) 1 member shall be appointed by the
12	President, who shall serve as chair of the Com-
13	mission;
14	(B) 1 member shall be appointed by the
15	leader of the Senate (majority or minority lead-
16	er, as the case may be) of the political party
17	that is not the same political party as the Presi-
18	dent, in consultation with the leader of the
19	House of Representatives (majority or minority
20	leader, as the case may be) of the same political
21	party as such Senate leader, who shall serve as
22	vice chair of the Commission;
23	(C) 2 members shall be appointed by the
24	senior member of the Senate leadership of the
25	Democratic Party;

1	(D) 2 members shall be appointed by the
2	senior member of the leadership of the House
3	of Representatives of the Republican Party;
4	(E) 2 members shall be appointed by the
5	senior member of the Senate leadership of the
6	Republican Party; and
7	(F) 2 members shall be appointed by the
8	senior member of the leadership of the House
9	of Representatives of the Democratic Party.
10	(2) Qualifications; initial meeting.—
11	(A) POLITICAL PARTY AFFILIATION.—Not
12	more than 5 members of the Commission shall
13	be from the same political party.

3	(D) DEADLINE FOR APPOINTMENT.—All
4	members of the Commission shall be appointed
5	during the period beginning January 21, 2021,
6	and ending February 5, 2021.
7	(E) Initial meeting.—The Commission
8	shall meet and begin the operations of the Com-
9	mission as soon as practicable.
10	(3) QUORUM; VACANCIES.—After its initial
11	meeting, the Commission shall meet upon the call of
12	the chair or a majority of its members. Six members
13	of the Commission shall constitute a quorum. Any
14	vacancy in the Commission shall not affect its pow-
15	ers, but shall be filled in the same manner in which
16	the original appointment was made.
17	(d) Functions of Commission.—The functions of
18	the Commission are to—
19	(1) conduct an investigation that—
20	(A) addresses the matters specified in sub-
21	section (b);
22	(B) investigates relevant facts and cir-
23	cumstances relating to the outbreak and spread
24	of COVID-19 in the United States, and the re-
25	sponse to such outbreak and spread, including

1	with respect to any relevant legislation, Execu-
2	tive order, regulation, plan, policy, practice, or
3	procedure; and
4	(C) may include relevant facts and cir-
5	cumstances relating to—
6	(i) Federal, State, and local authori-
7	ties with responsibilities relevant to the
8	outbreak and spread of COVID-19 in the
9	United States, including such authorities
10	with responsibilities relating to public
11	health, emergency management, and epi-
12	demic and pandemic preparedness and re-
13	sponse;
14	(ii) private sector organizations;
15	(iii) intelligence agencies and law en-
16	forcement agencies;
17	(iv) diplomacy and international co-
18	ordination;
19	(v) immigration and border control;
20	(vi) the role of congressional oversight
21	and resource allocation; and
22	(vii) other activities of the public and
23	private sectors determined relevant by the
24	Commission for its inquiry;

1	(2) identify, review, and evaluate the lessons
2	learned from the outbreak and spread of COVID-19
3	in the United States, and the response to such out-
4	break and spread, regarding the structure, coordina-
5	tion, management, policies, procedures, and actions
6	of Federal, State, and local governments and non-
7	governmental entities relative to preparing for, de-
8	tecting, preventing, and responding to epidemics and
9	pandemics, whether naturally occurring or caused by
10	a State or non-State actor; and
11	(3) submit to the President and Congress such
12	reports as are required by this section containing
13	such findings, conclusions, and recommendations as
14	the Commission shall determine, including proposing
15	organization, coordination, planning, management
16	arrangements, procedures, rules, and regulations.
17	(e) Powers of Commission.—
18	(1) In General.—
19	(A) HEARINGS AND EVIDENCE.—The
20	Commission or, on the authority of the Com-
21	mission, any subcommittee or member thereof,
22	may, for the purpose of carrying out this sec-
23	tion—
24	(i) hold such hearings and sit and act
25	at such times and places, take such testi-

1	mony, receive such evidence, and admin-
2	ister such oaths, as the Commission or
3	such designated subcommittee or des-
4	ignated member may determine advisable;
5	and
6	(ii) subject to subparagraph (B)(i),
7	require, by subpoena or otherwise, the at-
8	tendance and testimony of such witnesses
9	and the production of such books, records,
10	correspondence, memoranda, papers, and
11	documents, as the Commission or such
12	designated subcommittee or designated
13	member may determine advisable.
14	(B) Issuance of Subpoenas.—
15	(i) In general.—A subpoena may be
16	issued under this paragraph only—
17	(I) by the agreement of the chair
18	and the vice chair; or
19	(II) by the affirmative vote of 6
20	members of the Commission.
21	(ii) Signature.—Subject to clause
22	(i), subpoenas issued under this paragraph
23	may be issued under the signature of the
24	chair or any member designated by a ma-
25	jority of the Commission, and may be

1	served by any person designated by the
2	chair or by a member designated by a ma-
3	jority of the Commission.
4	(C) Enforcement of subpoenas.—
5	(i) IN GENERAL.—In the case of con-
6	tumacy or failure to obey a subpoena
7	issued under this paragraph, the United
8	States district court for the judicial district
9	in which the subpoenaed person resides, is
10	served, or may be found, or where the sub-
11	poena is returnable, may issue an order re-
12	quiring such person to appear at any des-
13	ignated place to testify or to produce docu-
14	mentary or other evidence. Any failure to
15	obey the order of the court may be pun-
16	ished by the court as a contempt of that
17	court.
18	(ii) Additional enforcement.—In
19	the case of any failure of any witness to
20	comply with any subpoena or to testify
21	when summoned under authority of this
22	subsection, the Commission may, by major-
23	ity vote, certify a statement of fact consti-
24	tuting such failure to the appropriate

United States attorney, who shall bring the

matter before the grand jury for its action, under the same statutory authority and procedures as if the United States attorney had received a certification under sections 102 through 104 of the Revised Statutes of the United States (2 U.S.C. 192 through 194).

(2) CONTRACTING.—The Commission may, to such extent and in such amounts as are provided in appropriation Acts, enter into contracts to enable the Commission to discharge its duties under this section.

(3) Information from federal agencies.—

(A) In General.—The Commission is authorized to secure directly from any executive department, bureau, agency, board, commission, office, independent establishment, or instrumentality of the Government, information, suggestions, estimates, and statistics for the purposes of this section. Each department, bureau, agency, board, commission, office, independent establishment, or instrumentality shall, to the fullest extent permitted by law, furnish such information, suggestions, estimates, and statistics directly to the Commission, upon request made

1	by the chair, the chair of any subcommittee cre-
2	ated by a majority of the Commission, or any
3	member designated by a majority of the Com-
4	mission.
5	(B) RECEIPT, HANDLING, STORAGE, AND
6	DISSEMINATION.—Information shall only be re-
7	ceived, handled, stored, and disseminated by
8	members of the Commission and its staff con-
9	sistent with all applicable statutes, regulations,
10	and Executive orders.
11	(4) Assistance from federal agencies.—
12	(A) GENERAL SERVICES ADMINISTRA-
13	TION.—The Administrator of General Services
14	shall provide to the Commission on a reimburs-
15	able basis administrative support and other
16	services for the performance of the Commis-
17	sion's functions.
18	(B) Other departments and agen-
19	CIES.—In addition to the assistance prescribed
20	in subparagraph (A), departments and agencies
21	of the United States may provide to the Com-
22	mission such services, funds, facilities, staff,
23	and other support services as they may deter-

mine advisable and as may be authorized by

law.

1	(5) GIFTS.—The Commission may accept, use,
2	and dispose of gifts or donations of services or prop-
3	erty.
4	(6) Postal services.—The Commission may
5	use the United States mails in the same manner and
6	under the same conditions as departments and agen-
7	cies of the United States.
8	(f) Nonapplicability of Federal Advisory Com-
9	MITTEE ACT.—
10	(1) In General.—The Federal Advisory Com-
11	mittee Act (5 U.S.C. App.) shall not apply to the
12	Commission.
13	(2) Public meetings and release of pub-
14	LIC VERSIONS OF REPORTS.—The Commission
15	shall—
16	(A) hold public hearings and meetings to
17	the extent appropriate; and
18	(B) release public versions of the reports
19	required under subsection (j).
20	(3) Public Hearings.—Any public hearings of
21	the Commission shall be conducted in a manner con-
22	sistent with the protection of information provided
23	to or developed for or by the Commission as re-
24	quired by any applicable statute, regulation, or Ex-
25	ecutive order.

1	(g) Staff of Commission.—
2	(1) In general.—
3	(A) APPOINTMENT AND COMPENSATION.—
4	The chair, in consultation with vice chair, in ac
5	cordance with rules agreed upon by the Com
6	mission, may appoint and fix the compensation
7	of a staff director and such other personnel as
8	may be necessary to enable the Commission to
9	carry out its functions, without regard to the
10	provisions of title 5, United States Code, gov
11	erning appointments in the competitive service
12	and without regard to the provisions of chapter
13	51 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of such
14	title relating to classification and Genera
15	Schedule pay rates, except that no rate of pay
16	fixed under this subsection may exceed the
17	equivalent of that payable for a position at leve
18	V of the Executive Schedule under section 5316
19	of title 5, United States Code.
20	(B) Personnel as federal employ
21	EES.—
22	(i) In general.—The staff director
23	and any personnel of the Commission who
24	are employees shall be employees under

section 2105 of title 5, United States

1	Code, for purposes of chapters 63, 81, 83,
2	84, 85, 87, 89, and 90 of that title.
3	(ii) Members of commission.—
4	Clause (i) shall not be construed to apply
5	to members of the Commission.
6	(2) Detailees.—Any Federal Government em-
7	ployee may be detailed to the Commission without
8	reimbursement from the Commission, and such
9	detailee shall retain the rights, status, and privileges
10	of his or her regular employment without interrup-
11	tion.
12	(3) Consultant Services.—The Commission
13	is authorized to procure the services of experts and
14	consultants in accordance with section 3109 of title
15	5, United States Code, but at rates not to exceed the
16	daily rate paid a person occupying a position at level
17	IV of the Executive Schedule under section 5315 of
18	title 5, United States Code.
19	(h) Compensation and Travel Expenses.—
20	(1) Compensation.—Each member of the
21	Commission may be compensated at not to exceed
22	the daily equivalent of the annual rate of basic pay
23	in effect for a position at level IV of the Executive
24	Schedule under section 5315 of title 5, United
25	States Code, for each day during which that member

is engaged in the actual performance of the dutiesof the Commission.

- (2) TRAVEL EXPENSES.—While away from their homes or regular places of business in the performance of services for the Commission, members of the Commission shall be allowed travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of subsistence, in the same manner as persons employed intermittently in the Government service are allowed expenses under section 5703 of title 5, United States Code.
- (i) SECURITY CLEARANCES FOR COMMISSION MEM-BERS AND STAFF.—The appropriate Federal agencies or departments shall cooperate with the Commission in expeditiously providing to the Commission members and staff appropriate security clearances to the extent possible pursuant to existing procedures and requirements, except that no person shall be provided with access to classified infor-mation under this section without the appropriate security clearances.

(j) Reports of Commission.—

(1) Interim reports.—The Commission may submit to the President and Congress interim reports containing such findings, conclusions, and recommendations for corrective measures as have been agreed to by a majority of Commission members.

1	(2) Final Report.—Not later than August 31,
2	2022, the Commission shall submit to the President,
3	Congress, and the public a final report containing
4	such findings, conclusions, and recommendations for
5	corrective measures as have been agreed to by a ma-
6	jority of Commission members.
7	(k) Termination.—
8	(1) In General.—The Commission, and all the
9	authorities of this section, shall terminate 60 days
10	after the date on which the final report is submitted
11	under subsection $(j)(2)$.
12	(2) Administrative activities before ter-
13	MINATION.—The Commission may use the 60-day
14	period referred to in paragraph (1) for the purpose
15	of concluding its activities, including providing testi-
16	mony to committees of Congress concerning its re-
17	ports and disseminating the final report.
18	(l) Funding.—
19	(1) Authorization of appropriations.—
20	There is authorized to be appropriated to the Com-
21	mission such sums as may be necessary for any fis-
22	cal year, half of which shall be derived from the ap-
23	plicable account of the House of Representatives,

and half of which shall be derived from the contin-

gent fund of the Senate.
